Primary Touchpoint

- **1-877-COVAXCO is able to register individuals for vaccine appointments - both in-home and community-based**

Key partners

State

CDPHE State Lab: Leverage contractors to deploy vaccines with State support for scheduling, routing, troubleshooting, etc

Partner with counties who have local vaccine distribution solutions

Progress to date on Medicaid population

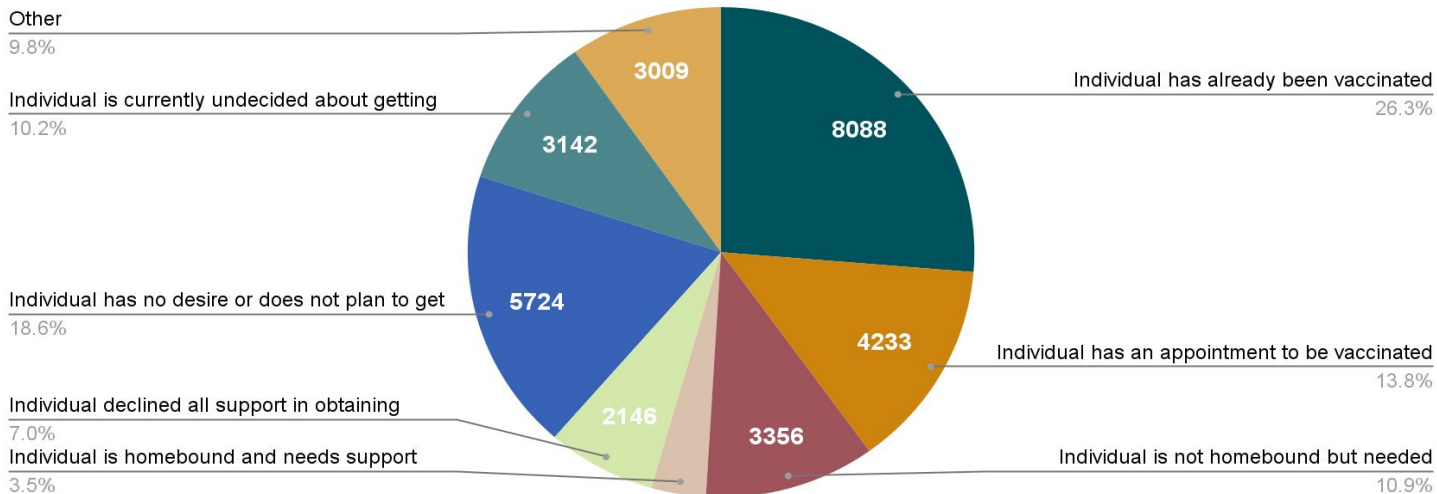

Community Health and Planning

Guiding Policies from the American Planning Association:

1. Engage older adults and apply a demographic lens to planning
2. Develop a range of affordable and accessible housing options
3. Ensure access to safe and reliable transportation options - support transit-oriented development
4. Use land-use and zoning tools to create integrated communities that foster social engagement and connectedness
5. Support local economic development policies and planning that supports paid and unpaid caregivers
6. Draw on older adults as a community asset
